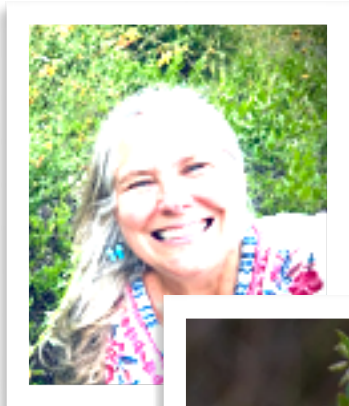

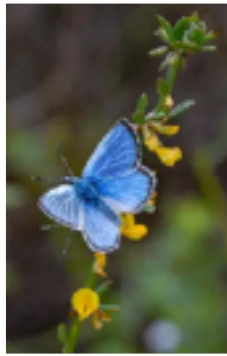
Jana Johnson

Fluttering on the Brink- Saving the endangered Palos Verdes Blue Butterfly

Jana Johnson is a tenured professor at Moorpark College and holds adjunct positions with SMC & UCLA. Her lab at Moorpark College is a grad lab in a community college setting and known as the



Endangered Butterfly Project. Her research is endangered



Lepidoptera and it is her absolute joy to release captive reared endangered butterflies to the wild multiple times each year from the efforts of her community college-based student lab. Jana single-handedly brought this delicate and beautiful butterfly back from the brink of extinction. The beautiful Palos Verdes Blue butterfly can be seen on the **Matt Willey** mural located at the Laguna Beach County Water District. When the Laguna Beach Garden Club commissioned the



mural Matt felt strongly about including this incredible creature in his effort to bring to light the plight of the pollinators in his mural.

Jana received her B.A. in Biology from UT and briefly pursued a career in pharmaceutical research. She returned to school and received an M.S. in Biology from Texas State University and discovered her passion for Ecology. She went on to receive her PhD in Biology at UCLA.

Container Gardens

Have you started planning the container garden you will donate to the *Valentine Extravaganza*? For me, inspiration begins with a container. The size, color, and texture of the container influence the design of the tiny garden inside. The good news is that almost anything can serve as a planter! Plant pots, whether terra cotta or glazed, are lovely, but nearly anything you find can be transformed into a planter. Baskets, shells, bowls, and cans can become stylish or quirky planters for your container garden. Thrift stores, garage sales, or "trashquisitions" are perfect sources for interesting containers. To turn anything into a planter, add a hole. Don't have a hole in your container? Then it's a cache pot—don't plant directly in it. Instead, create a container garden in a slightly smaller plastic pot and place that inside the cache pot on a layer of gravel for drainage. Finish the look with moss or stones on top. I can't wait to see what you create!

Toys must be unwrapped and in their original packaging or box. Sports equipment (balls, tennis racquets, baseball bats, etc.) are not required to have a box or package. The fire department cannot distribute clothing, personal care items, blankets, etc.

Items for older children are in high demand.

On November 12 Club members **Jane Leary** and **Georgia Zachariah** delivered a \$1500 check to **Joe Stead and Magali Martinez of Orange Coast College**. The grant will be used to purchase seeds for fall and spring plantings, lettuce seeds for their aquaponics greenhouses, and two PH/EC meters

The 200+ horticulture students can earn certificates and AA degrees in subjects like soil science, plant propagation, plant science and plant and tree identification all designed to help them get good paying jobs at botanical gardens, large estates (think Sunnylands in Palm Springs) and hotel gardens (like the beautiful gardens at the Montage) taking them way beyond the mow-blow-go level.

The OCC horticulture department is a beautiful 1.5 acres filled with a variety of plants and trees, 90 garden plots tended by students growing all manner of fruits and vegetables, along with 7 greenhouses, 3 of which are aquaponics where they grow food with no soil and use fish they raise to fertilize the plants! The lettuce tastes amazing and lasts for weeks in your fridge. It's fascinating and uses very little water as it is recycled and used within the system.

Joe and Magali and their team were *thrilled* with our donation which will go a long way to help ensure their students' success.
